# The Infrastructure-Economy Project

The program, “Rebuild America’s Infrastructure & Economy”, is scheduled for four cities in Wisconsin starting September 16, 2015.

The purpose of this program is to educate our communities about reasons the American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) gave an overall grade of D+ for 16 categories of America’s infrastructure, and to advocate for increased infrastructure spending. In short, investing in infrastructure is an engine for long-term economic growth, increased GDP, employment, household income, and exports. The reverse is also true — without investing, infrastructure can become a drag on the economy. See:

This program builds on a successful program, “Fix the Infrastructure/Kick-start the Economy” offered in Milwaukee October 25, 2014, by the Natural Resources Committee of the League of Women Voters of Milwaukee County. The program can be viewed at the following link:

The American Society of Civil Engineers - Wisconsin Section (ASCE-WI) is providing speakers for the presentation, “ASCE Infrastructure Report Card.” The economics presentation, “Repair our Infrastructure and Jolt the Economy,” will be given by Emeritus Professor of Economics, William Holahan, PhD, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Together these presentations make an effective case for funding infrastructure repairs today, thereby shifting current liabilities to future assets. It is a case that decision-makers, community leaders, and citizens need to consider.

The budget for the project is \$10,000 to provide honoraria for two speakers of \$1,000 per event, and expenses which include transportation, food, and lodging. However, honoraria for ASCE speakers will be contributed to the ASCE - Wisconsin Section Scholarship Fund. Honoraria for Dr. Holahan will go the UW-Milwaukee Foundation to fund the Holahan Prize for Outstanding Teaching Assistants in Economics.

# LWV-MC's Focus for Fall: Redistricting, the Constitutional Amendment Process, and Money in Politics

(LWV-US “Key Structures of Democracy” Adopted as National Program for 2014-2016)

Among the program proposals made by Leagues around the country in program-making meetings in January, 2014 were redistricting; amending the Constitution; and money in politics. At League National Convention in June, 2014, delegates chose these three “Key Structures of Democracy” as the issues for focus, study, and in the case of the latter two, consensus for the 2014-2016 biennium.

A national study is typically a two-year endeavor: during the first year (2014-2015) committees at the national League level gathered materials and disseminated information via the national website. They invited local and state Leagues to take up the issues in the second year (2015-2016) by reading the materials, holding educational meetings, adding local slant on the issues, and responding to questions to determine member consensus on key aspects of the issues. This ambitious undertaking will end by June, 2016 when any positions resulting from study and consensus will be adopted and, thereafter, used as the basis for action.

Three committees at the national League level have been collecting and disseminating information on: redistricting in the states; the process of amending the Constitution; and money in politics.

In preparation for October and November meetings, there are things that we can do to inform ourselves about these topics that are critical for our democracy.

Redistricting in the States is not a study, but a task force gathering data on how legislative districts are determined across the U.S. and on the redistricting positions held by Leagues around the country. Constitutional Amendment Study focuses on the process of amending the Constitution. Information on the Constitutional Amendment Study, including suggested readings and the Constitutional Amendment Study questions, are now available on the LWV-US website (see links on next page).

Money in Politics Review and Update involves a member study and consensus to update the League’s position on campaign finance in order to obtain member understanding and agreement on the extent to which political campaigns are protected speech under the First Amendment. Leagues are being asked to consider: the rights of individuals and organizations to express their political views through independent expenditures and the finance of election campaign activities; and how those rights, if any, should be protected and reconciled with the interests set out in our current position on campaign financing.

The key structures of democracy operate at all levels of democracy and reform is needed everywhere, not just in Washington, DC.

## TIMELINE:

**Now into November:** Read the education materials posted on the League website (see links above) in anticipation of general meetings this fall;

**October 2015:** Participate in the Consensus on the Constitutional Amendment Study. Study materials and consensus questions have been posted (see Two Ways to Participate on next page).

**October 24, 2015:** Attend the general meeting and unit meetings thereafter on Redistricting.

**November 2015:** Participate in the Consensus on the Money in Politics Review. Education materials are available now and consensus questions will be posted in October. Attend the November general meeting and November unit meetings for the purpose of reaching consensus.

**December 1, 2015, and February 1, 2016:** Consensus reports (one electronic report per League) are due to LWV-US. Our member consensus results will be presented to the LWV-MC Board in November and January and reported to national League by the respective deadlines.

**April 2016 national LWV Board meeting:** Consensus reports and resulting position(s), if any, will be approved and adopted as part of LWV-US Program in June 2016.

The Voter Services Committee needs lots of hands to accomplish our ambitious plans before the 2016 elections. We have widened our focus to many more areas of voter registration. We continue to register newly naturalized citizens at the Federal Courthouse and to participate in National Voter Registration Day. But we are now branching out to include: registering at the Veterans Administration Community Resource Center, working with nonprofit groups to reach underserved voters, and distributing the High School Voter Education Toolkit to all MPS schools. We need more members to become Special Registration Deputies (SRDs) in our communities so that we can assist even more voters.

We are preparing for changes in state laws regarding photo ID and registration requirements. There will be collaborations with partner groups in Get Out the Vote (GOTV) activities.

We are organizing a work group to plan the January 9, 2016 general meeting to focus on ways of *Energizing the Electorate*.

We anticipate in the spring being asked to collaborate on Candidate Forums. Training will be provided for League members interested in being moderators and time keepers.

## Becoming American

(Adapted from the writing of Karen Pommer\*)

In a campaign season dominated by appeals to patriotism and debate over immigration, it is enlightening to see our country through the eyes of people who are becoming new citizens.

At a recent naturalization ceremony in the Federal Courthouse, 49 people were officially welcomed to America. The judge began by reading out the list of countries these immigrants came from. *Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Belgium, Botswana, Bulgaria, Cambodia, . . .* She asked the people to raise their hands when their home countries were named. . . . *China, Colombia, Congo, Dominican Republic, Egypt, El Salvador, Ghana, . . .* She told them to hold their hands high and say “Here!” with pride. . . . *Guatemala, India, Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Laos, Mexico, Nicaragua, Pakistan, . . .* Everyone smiled and greeted the people whose countries were just named. . . . *Peru, Somalia, Sudan, Taiwan, Turkey, Uganda, Vietnam, and Zimbabwe.* Some of them waved the little flags included in their citizenship packets as they smiled and loudly declared their presence.



Before they took the Oath of Allegiance, the judge told her own immigration story from Haiti – how she had lived for eight years without her parents as they built their lives in America to the point where they could bring their children over. She told them how she took the same pledge over 10 years later as a college student. She talked about the 49 different stories there in that room and then said to the new Americans:

*Tell us your stories. Celebrate your culture. Share your art and your music with us. Share your food! We like food! Be proud of where you came from and add your part of it to us.*

She also reminded them of the responsibilities that go along with citizenship – the first and foremost being voting. She pointed out that the League of Women Voters had a stand set up outside the courtroom where they could now register right away. She mentioned other ways they could make meaningful contributions to the country. And then they all stood up and recited the Oath.

Afterwards each one was individually congratulated as cameras flashed at huge smiles and quite a few tears. Their faces made it obvious how important the day was to each and every one of them. It seemed evident that the country had just gained 49 patriots of the truest kind – people who didn’t take the freedoms this country offers for granted. Diverse people for whom patriotism was a complex concept and a new feeling, not simply campaign rhetoric. Newcomers who remind us to celebrate our country as a nation of immigrants and acknowledge the contributions and enrichment so many foreign-born, naturalized citizens have brought to this country.



\* **Karen Pommer** is the daughter of longtime League member Mary Stefaniak and the sister of *The Voter’s* Editor, Chris Hansen. Karen and her husband live in Austria with two daughters adopted from Ethiopia. On a visit to Milwaukee last month, the Pommer family observed a naturalization ceremony, anticipating that their teenage girls would also, one day, become American citizens.
